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Franklin Board of Education develops new vision, goals, and objectives

A new vision, goals, and objectives adopted by the Franklin Board of Education are designed so that all of the district's resources are working efficiently and are focused on ensuring that district graduates are college-and-career ready.

The updated Continuous Improvement Plan was developed by the board in weekly meetings early this year, and was formally adopted at board meetings this spring. Each goal has a number of measurable objectives and action steps.

The vision and goals replace

those that the district had adopted and been operating under since the early 2000s.

According to district superintendent Dr. Mike Sander, everything the district does is to increase student achievement. "Our goal is to ensure that Franklin graduates are college-and-career ready and that the 13 years spent in Franklin City Schools are ones of academic growth." Sander said.

While a few of the objectives and action steps focus on internal procedures, many others will be visible to students, parents, building visitors, and the general public. Examples include enhanced building security features; soliciting students' ideas for clubs and activities; a quarterly newsletter mailed to every household in the district boundaries; new busses to decrease the fleet's average age; updating the financial area of the district website; and updating the website, building signage, and logo.

The Board views this Continuous Improvement plan as a living document. They plan to periodically review the district's progress against the goals and will update objectives and action steps as needed in order to ensure and enhance students' preparation for colleges and careers.

The district's new vision is "The Franklin City School District will work in

partnership with families and the community to educate all individuals to be responsible, lifelong learners who possess the skills, knowledge, creativity, self-worth, and ethical values necessary to thrive in a rapidly changing, culturally diverse, global society."

Goals cover four areas: Student Success, Communications and Public Relations, Financial Resources, and District Support Services (Facilities, Nutrition, and Transportation).

The Student Success goal says "Every student progresses in his or her learning in order to be college- or career-ready upon graduation." Objectives for this goal are around the Ohio New
